

# Essay Template

Before you look at the template, here's a few key points for using it.

Try writing a bullet point for each main point you want to include: 'This is relevant because...' If you can't, have a re-think. This will also help you to explain your points in your writing.

Each paragraph should focus on one main point or theme. You can use WEED to structure each one:

**W**hat the paragraph is about

**E**xplain what you mean (e.g., definitions)

**E**xamples and evidence throughout

**D**o something with the information: what does it mean or suggest? How does it add to your argument?

Look at this paragraph to see what we mean:

One of the main differences between studying at university and school or college is the type of research needed to complete assignments. This is because studying at university requires students to engage with a range of academic ideas and research so that they become experts in their subjects and universities are places where new ideas are developed. According to Choudrey (2019) and Beko (2017), students should research for their assignments using resources in the library and from online sources. They both stress that website-based research should be done carefully to avoid reliance on unreliable and non-academic sources. This is further supported in the work of Cottrell (2012). Additionally, Choudrey (2019) adds that reading lists from lecturers should be used because these will often include the most relevant resources for any assignment. These opinions are in contrast to Hennessy (1998) who argues that at least first year students should only refer to lecture notes for research. However, Hennessy was writing before students had wide-reaching and regular access to online resources and their advice may now be outdated. It also ignores the importance of module reading lists, which Choudrey (2019) emphasises. Therefore, although reviewing lecture notes is a good first step in writing an assignment at university, students should ideally learn to research using reliable academic sources and especially those recommended by their lecturers.
